"If you can keep your head while all about you are losing theirs and blaming it on you..."

This excerpt from Rudyard Kipling's poem "If," certainly applies to today's world.

Let's talk about carbon and carbon dioxide in common sense scientific terms. Our Planet Earth is a carbon (C) based system for the support of life as we know it. UPDATE ON TAPPPS GROUP

(Texas Animal Protein Producers Prosperity and Security)

Many independent ranchers and consumers have been working for over 14 months on the Agriculture and Meat Production Act (AMP Act) http://www.theampact.com.

Mike Eby and myself are involved in this endeavor. The goal is to find a legislative sponsor for these nine sections, and two must win if independent agriculture and competition are to survive.

First is the American Beef Labeling Act, which addresses beef labeling. This addresses the bogus and biased concerns in 2015 by the Appellate Panel of the current dismantled World Trade Organization's partial appellate panel. This new Act would be a new bill and require a new filing if any country wanted to take it on. That being the case, the most recent report shows that the WTO is currently in disarray since President Trump stepped in on December 10, 2019, and broke it up. In the past, most cases were being filed against the USA. We were targeted and, once again, became the dumping ground for cheap unmarked beef imports.

The most recent evidence on this is Paraguay's imported beef quota request that USDA Ag Secretary Tom Vilsack is trying to justify beef imports from a disease known country headed here for USA consumers.

Second is the Opportunities for Fairness in Farming Act (OFF Act). This act would give more checks and balances to the corrupt and abuses of our Beef Checkoff funds. The NCBA is the largest contractor of these funds (in 2023, over 25.72 ml dollars), and as you all know, they have been found guilty, as well as other state associations and abusing handling these funds. Laundering is well hidden. which is partly why it is so secretly guarded by those controlling it. OCM had to file for disclosure of all documents a few years ago, and they did not cooperate in giving the

humans but provides the important fiber humans need for healthy digestive function. It is, however, a primary food source for animals we and the planet need. requested information. Go to the Checkoff Beef Board (<u>www.beefboard.org</u>) and review the laundering of cash to these organizations under the link "Authorization Request" for 2023. A few examples are 2011-R's Study of Pandemic Buying Behaviors for over \$8.25 million and 2311's Education of Food Safety on Pathogens for another \$8.1 Million. Don't we have better things to do with this money? Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) does food safety! There are two zones for money on a single request-direct costs and implementation costs. It is a cash cow for NCBA, and they use it against many of us to promote their agenda of failures.

Recently the CEO of NCBA claimed that they had firewalls on these committees handling the funding request. He forgot to mention that almost everyone sitting on those boards is a member of the NCBA or state affiliates. So just how secure is that system? NCBA says R-CALF USA and OCM are not about improving the checkoff but killing it. Under its current state, it needs to be eliminated if we can't get full disclosure, transparency, and an end to laundering money for lobbying. Give me nonfraudulent MCOOL, and I would give you \$2.00 per head with board seat elections at large vs. the pay-to-play scheme like today's seats.

This past month, I attended a Farm Bill Listening session with Representative and House Ag Chairman GT Thompson and Kansas Rep. Tracy Mann (who chairs one of the advisory committees to the Ag Committee) in Gygsum, Kansas. and it seems that many of our issues have been disregarded by these legislators. Also in May, I attended another Ag roundtable in Colby, Kansas, with Kansas Senator Roger Marshall, who also sits on the Senate Ag Committee. Again, I was allowed to present these issues; however, we have yet to see much public support for these items of high importance. They all seem to be listening to the lobbying power players who dole out the cash for their elections, and many times they need to be fully educated and informed with facts. If we win on the OFF Act, the game changes overnight!

On June 1, 2023, the TAPPPS group held two press meetings on the AMP Act, and we have to get the word out if we want success!

I hope to see all of you at the 2023 OCM Convention at the Kansas City Airport Marriott on July 28th and 29th.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE FROM CAPITOL HILL Farm Bill. 1 can

Marty Irby is a director and board secretary at the Organization for Competitive Markets and a registered lobbyist who is the president and CEO of Capitol South, LLC in Washington, D.C..

Today, the National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA), and other groups that continue to oppose the Opportunities for Fairness in Farming (OFF) Act, H.R. 1249/S. 557, led by Sens. Mike Lee, R-Utah, Cory Booker, D-N.J., Rand Paul, R-Ky., and Elizabeth Warren, D-Mass., in the Senate, and Reps. Nancy Mace, R-S.C., and Dina Titus, D-Nev., in the House have gotten more vicious than ever. Along with their co-horts at Berman Co. they came out in full force with a campaign to oust me as Chief Operating Officer at FreedomWorks, and for a variety of reasons I chose to resign my post a few weeks ago. Is this what your checkoff dollars are being spent on?

But do not fear, I am not backing down, and in fact I am doubling down in my work to enact the OFF Act and secure its inclusion in the upcoming

Farm Bill. I can promise you that Big Ag and NCBA have messed with the wrong person. My autonomy to work on the issues I care about most is far more important to me than a paycheck, so I have opened my own lobbying and public relations firm in Washington, Capitol South, LLC, to continue working on farm bill and other issues. While I am a lifelong Christian who attended Wesley Theological Seminary, I may have to go Old Testament on this one.

The OFF Act continues to build tremendous momentum with astounding support for the measure, mostly farmers and ranchers, who are sick and tired of seeing their own money used to put them out of Checkoffs business. were established to help farmers, not hurt them as we continue to see with NCBA, the National Pork Producers Council, and of course Dairy Management, Inc., where the swampiest of all swamp rats, USDA Secretary worked for the

four-year period in between his stints under Barack Obama and Joe Biden. As many of you may recall, Vilsack raked in more than \$800,000 a year in salary during that time.

We expect the House Farm

Bill base text to be released to the public in August and may see a committee markup and attempt to pass the bill through the House in September, and it is likely that the Senate text will be released within weeks of the House bill. But it's going to be an uphill battle to get the votes needed to pass the Farm Bill due to the tightest margins we've seen in the House in decades, and the potential inclusion of the EATS Act, led by Rep. Ashley Hinson, R-lowa. and Sen. Roger Marshall, R-Kansas, a poison pill rider that's nothing more than an updated version of the old Amendment" OCM "King helped successfully strip out of the 2018 Farm Bill. EATS would nullify many state agriculture laws that help farmers and ranchers and is primarily focused on nullifying Prop 12 that the U.S. Supreme Court upheld a few weeks ago in a decision written by Justice Neil Gorsch.

As a result, the renewed effort to enact the EATS Act and assault on states' rights by NCBA, NPPC, Smithfield, JBS, and others, OCM has decided to launch a new campaign against the measure in similar fashion to what we did in 2018.

We received a grant that enabled us to purchase Politico advertisements in Morning Ag. Politico Weekly Ag, Politico's website, and a full page in the print edition that have run this month. It's a big OCM and we boost for anticipate additional grants coming in to help with this cause.


We also recently saw the reintroduction of the PRIME Act, H.R. 2814/S.907, by Reps. Thomas Massie, R-Ky., Chellie Pingree, D-Maine, and Sens. Angus King, D-Maine, and Rand Paul, R-Ky., that would help producers revive local processing plants and curb federal regulations on intrastate hauling, slaughter, and processing. As usual, NCBA opposes this bill that would rein in the heavy hand of the USDA, and help many cattle producers in the Southeastern U.S. who are barely keeping their head above water. because increasing smaller processing facilities will be a threat to JBS, Smithfield, Cargill, and the rest of the Big Packer Cartel that NCBA represents.

We believe that the OFF Act and PRIME Act can successfully be included in the Farm Bill, and the EATS Act can be prevented from inclusion in the final product due to the strategies we've developed with lawmakers on both the far right and far left who have convinced me they are willing to hold the entire Farm Bill hostage in the House and Senate over each of these three provisions.

We are rising up, we are making headway, and the Big Packer Cartel as well as their whipping boys at NCBA, NPPC, and other groups, are absolutely scared to death. They know that if the OFF Act is enacted some of their folks could be facing indictments and jailtime, and if PRIME is enacted the Big Packer Cartel will lose a percentage of their monopolized market share. I also believe that if the EATS Act is enacted, the average family farmer in America will quickly be shut down and the Big Packer Cartel aligned with the USDA, and others in the Federal Government will further consolidate food

production and grow their monopoly, putting us all at an even greater risk of food shortage.

Please stay tuned as there will be many twists and turns along the road to the Farm Bill's enactment which will at the earliest occur in December, but may likely be punted into 2024 if Congress decides to extend the existing 2018 law to give them more time to overcome the many obstacles this Farm Bill faces.
